GAME OVERVIEW

- Calgary has an all-time 75-120-3 regular-season record against Edmonton, including a 32-66-1 mark on the road.
- Calgary is coming off a 31-23 home win over Winnipeg on Aug. 8.
- The Eskimos are coming off a 28-21 road loss in Hamilton on Aug. 8.
- Calgary was 6-3 on the road in 2008 and is 1-1 this season. Edmonton was 7-2 at home in 2008 and is 2-1 at Commonwealth this season.
- The Stamps had a 1-2 record against Edmonton in 2008 — losing 34-31 in Edmonton on July 3, losing 37-16 at home on Labour Day (Sept. 1) and winning 38-33 in Edmonton on Sept. 5.
- Stamps QB Henry Burris needs 239 passing yards to surpass Doug Flutie's club record of 20,551 career passing yards.

- The Stamps are 6-4 in their last 10 games against Edmonton.
- Calgary is 4-6 in its last 10 road games against Edmonton.
- Calgary has scored the most points in the league (203) and Edmonton has allowed the second most points (189).
- Calgary RB Joffrey Reynolds is tied for the CFL lead with seven majors.
- The Stamps are third in the CFL with a plus-7 turnover ratio and Edmonton is last in the league at minus-11.
- Edmonton has the league's No. 2 pass offence and Calgary is second in pass defence.
- This is the fifth consecutive season the Stamps have started 3-3.
- Stamps DE Odell Willis leads the CFL with six sacks.



STAMPEDERS STORYLINES

STAMPS TRYING TO GO OVER .500

After beating the Winnipeg Blue Bombers on Aug. 8, the Stamps found themselves with a 3-3 record for the fifth year in a row. The Stamps won their seventh game of 2008 to go over .500 but they lost the seventh game in each of the three previous seasons. The Stamps lost two of three games to the Eskis last season.

NUCLEUS INTACT

The Stamps have 37 players back from the 46 men who were on the 2008 Grey Cup roster. The only departures are: LB JoJuan Armour, DL Eddie Freeman, DL Howard Hodges, DL Charleston Hughes, DL Pat MacDonald, LB Saleem Rasheed, LB Neil Ternovatsky, OL Antonio Hall and QB Will Proctor. In addition, all 12 Grey Cup offensive starters are back with the club, as are six defensive starters.

NO. 1 CLOSING ON NO. 1

With a decent game this week against the Eskimos, Henry Burris will become the Stamps' all-time leading passer in terms of yardage. Burris needs 239 passing yards to move past Doug Flutie into top spot. In fact, Burris is quickly closing on Flutie in most major franchise passing categories. At his current pace, he will become the all-time leader in passing yards, touchdown passes, pass attempts and completions this summer. Here's a look at how Burris fits into the club's leaderboards:

BURRIS BUILDING ON 2008

Stamps quarterback Henry Burris had a career year in 2008 and was named the West Division nominee for Most Outstanding Player before he was the Grey Cup MVP.

Under his direction, the Stamps led the CFL with a 13-5 record and won two playoff games, including the Grey Cup over Montreal. Burris was particularly good when the games mattered most. He had a 10-3 record (including post-season) against teams with a winning record.

Burris also led all CFL quarterbacks with 595 rushing yards (career high is 623, in 2007), to go with a career-high 8.6 yards per carry and three touchdowns.

Burris threw his 100th touchdown as a member of the Stampeders in Week 11 last season against Edmonton. Ryan Thelwell was on the receiving end of the three-yard touchdown. HUFF THE VET

In his second year as head coach/GM of the Stamps, John Hufnagel owns the second-longest active tenure of any head coach in the CFL. Huff was hired on Dec. 3, 2007. Only Wally Buono of the BC Lions has been with his team longer. Here is the list, in order of service time:

SIX NEW STARTERS ON DEFENCE

While the Stamps enjoy some continuity from their 2008 championship season, many changes have been made to the starting defence. In fact, there are six first-year CFLers among the starting dozen, while Mike Labinjo is in his first season at defensive tackle after playing defensive end in 2008, and second-year safety Milt Collins started just two games as a rookie last season. The six newcomers are MLB Tray Blackmon, DE Odell Willis, DE Malik Jackson, HB Davanzo Tate, HB Ronnie Amadi and DT Tom Johnson.

STAMPS YOUNG ON DEFENCE

Only the Hamilton Tiger-Cats have a younger starting defence than Calgary's dominant dozen. Led by six first-year players, the Stamps' average age is 25.7 years. Tray Blackmon is the youngest at 23 (Oct. 20, 1985), while Dwaine Carpenter is the oldest at 32 (Nov. 4, 1976). Here's how all CFL teams compare (prior to Week 5):

TERRIFIC TWO-GAME TOTAL

The Stampeders defence allowed a total of just 19 points in Week 3 and 4 wins over Toronto and BC. That is the Stamps' lowest two-game total of points allowed since 2001. It is just the second time in 13 seasons Calgary has yielded fewer than 20 points over a two-game stretch.

Despite a valiant comeback attempt, the Calgary Stampeders were dealt their first loss of the 2008 Canadian Football League season. The Stamps trailed the Edmonton Eskimos 21-7 at halftime but scored 14 points in the fourth quarter and held a 31-27 lead with less than a minute remaining at Commonwealth Stadium. But Esks quarterback Ricky Ray hit Jason Tucker for a 36-yard touchdown with 55 seconds remaining for the victory. "We didn't play well in the first half and didn't get things going until it was too late," said Stamps head coach/general manager John Hufnagel. "You have to give credit to the Eskimos and we need to get better. You have to chalk this up as a learning experience and not make the mistakes that we made tonight." Edmonton opened the scoring on its second possession when Ray connected with Kelly Campbell for a 32-yard touchdown. On the final play of the first quarter, Jermaine Copeland caught a 15-yard pass from Henry Burris to even the score. Edmonton scored the next 14 points to make the halftime score 21-7. Out of the break, Burris led Calgary on a 64-yard scoring drive that ended with a three-yard Joffrey Reynolds touchdown run. After an exchange of kicking points, Burris hit a streaking Brett Ralph for a 65-yard touchdown to cut the Eskimos lead to 26-24. Nik Lewis then hauled in a Burris pass and took it to the house for a 20-yard score and Calgary's first lead of the night. But the late charge was foiled by Ray and Tucker.

The Calgary Stampeders disappointed a sold-out Labour Day crowd at McMahon Stadium, losing 37-16 to the Edmonton Eskimos.

The defeat dropped the Stamps' Canadian Football League record to 5-4 and allowed Edmonton to improve to 6-3.

Ricky Ray led the Esks with three touchdown passes, including a pair to Fred Stamps.

Edmonton's first possession was an 85-yard scoring drive that was capped by a nine-yard touchdown run by A.J. Harris. Calgary answered right back with a 76-yard drive that ended with a 25-yard field goal by Sandro DeAngelis.

The second quarter highlighted the kickers as DeAngelis kicked two more field goals and Noel Prefontaine added a pair of field goals of his own. A safety gave Edmonton a 12-9 lead at halftime.

Starting Stamps pivot Henry Burris left late in the second quarter with a foot injury. Dave Dickenson replaced Burris and led Calgary on a 75-yard drive to start the second half. The finishing blow was a three-yard touchdown run by Joffrey Reynolds.

But Ray brought the Esks right back into the lead by firing a 24-yard touchdown pass to Kamau Peterson.

Newcomer Nate Curry then fumbled a punt return for Calgary that was recovered by Edmonton and led to a 22-yard touchdown pass Ray to Stamps.

Ray then threw a 25-yard major to Stamps in the fourth quarter to account for the rest of the scoring.

Barrick Nealy replaced Dickenson in the fourth quarter for some playing time but, like his predecessors, had little success.

For the seventh time in 10 games, the Calgary Stampeders played a game decided by a touchdown or less. The latest nail-biter was a 38-33 decision over the Edmonton Eskimos at Commonwealth Stadium. The game came down to the final minute and the Stamps secured victory by foiling an Eskimos onside kick attempt.

Calgary's first offensive play was a fumbled shotgun snap that was recovered by Edmonton linebacker Shannon Garrett and returned 25 yards for a touchdown. But the Stamps showed great character and marched 81 yards for a Ryan Thelwell touch-down — Henry Burris' 100th TD toss as a Stamp — on the next possession. With the teams tied 14-14, the first offensive play of the second half also resulted in a defensive touchdown as Stamps linebacker Shannon James intercepted Ricky Ray and raced 27 yards for a score.

The final quarter featured 30 points and Jeremaine Copeland started the fireworks with an eight-yard touchdown pass from Burris. Ray replied with a nine-yard touchdown run but the Stamps answered right back when Ken-Yon Rambo made a fantastic 27-yard touchdown catch to give Calgary a 38-26 lead with less than two minutes remaining.

Edmonton made the Stamps sweat again when Mathieu Bertrand scored a two-yard touchdown run with less than a minute to play but the threat was ended when Calgary recovered the onside kick.

James had a brilliant night with seven defensive tackles, a special-teams tackle, a sack, a forced fumble, a pick and a touchdown. The Stamps recorded a season-high five sacks, with defensive end Mike Labinjo responsible for three.

The Calgary Stampeders couldn't overcome a poor start or the kicking of Damon Duval in their 2009 season-opener at McMahon Stadium. The Stamps fell into an early 20-0 hole and wound up losing 40-27 to the Montreal Alouettes as the rematch of the 2008 Grey Cup produced a different winner.

Calgary had a late chance to take the lead thanks to a blocked punt by Tristan Black that gave the Stamps the ball at the Montreal 23-yard line. However, a sack of Henry Burris, a fumble and a recovery by Chip Cox led to a game-sealing 81-yard return touchdown. Calgary turned the ball over four times and also committed 10 penalties.

After a poor first quarter that saw Calgary fall behind 17-0, a couple of special plays by the special teams in the second quarter helped get the Stamps back into the contest. First, a spectacular 104-yard kickoff return by rookie Titus Ryan gave the home team its first points of the night.

Then, a blocked punt by Wes Lysack and a recovery by Dwight Anderson gave the Stamps the ball at the Montreal 31. Calgary capitalized with its second touchdown of the game, capping the drive with a four-yard touchdown pass from Burris to Jeremaine Copeland.

Calgary knotted the score at 27-27 with 10 third-quarter points. First, Burris scored a touchdown on a four-yard keeper and Sandro DeAngelis booted a 41-yard field goal to pull Calgary even.

The Alouettes were very sharp from the opening kickoff as they took the first drive 81 yards on five plays for a touchdown. Calvillo and Kerry Watkins connected on a 37-yard strike to complete the sequence. Second time with the ball, the Als doubled their lead as Avon Cobourne ran the ball in from 10 yards.

Costly turnovers, untimely penalties and, for a good part of the night, an ineffective offence added up the Calgary Stampeders' second straight loss to open the 2009 Canadian Football League season. Four Calgary giveaways led to four Winnipeg touchdowns at Canad Inns Stadium as Calgary dropped a 42-30 decision to the Blue Bombers.

For a second consecutive week, the Stampeders stumbled out of the gate.

The Blue Bombers' Mike Kelly — who collected his first win as a head coach on the night — resorted to some trickery on the game's opening kick-off as he asked Alexis Serna to boot the ball short. The play worked as Winnipeg recovered and that set up a five-play, 39-yard drive for a 24-yard Serna field goal.

After Calgary went two-and-out on its first possession, the Blue Bombers came right back to march the ball 67 yards for a touchdown. The drive was capped by an eight-yard touchdown pass from Stefan LeFors to Terrence Edwards. Winnipeg added a second LeFors-to-Edwards touchdown connection late in the opening half.

The clubs traded short touchdowns runs in the third quarter. First, it was Lavarus Giles running the ball in from the two for the Bombers' third touchdown of the night. The Stamps replied with their first major as Joffrey Reynolds caught a pitch and scored from the one-yard line.

The Stamps tried to mount a comeback with a 99-yard drive that was capped by Henry Burris' one-yard keeper for a touchdown, but the Bombers bounced right back with an interception return for touchdown by Siddeeq Shabazz. Giles' second touchdown run of the game was essentially the icing on the cake for the Bombers. Barrick Nealy, who relieved Burris, led the Red and White on a couple of late touchdown drives to make the final score somewhat more respectable. First, he hooked up with Jeremaine Copeland and then he found Teyo Johnson in the end-zone in the final minute of the game.

The Calgary Stampeders defence obviously had enough. After allowing 82 points in the first two games of the season, the Stamps kept the Toronto Argonauts in check and recorded a 44-9 victory Friday at McMahon Stadium. The win was Calgary's first of 2009 and allows the Stampeders to pull into a three-way tie for second place in the West Division with Edmonton and BC. Not only did the defence record six sacks and hold the Argos out of the end-zone, the unit scored three touchdowns — one on Dwaine Carpenter's fumble return and two on interception returns by Dwight Anderson and Brandon Browner. Running back Joffrey Reynolds scored a couple of touchdowns for Calgary — one rushing and one receiving — as the Stampeders extended their home-field winning streak against the Boatmen to four games. For the first time this season, the Stampeders opened the scoring as Reynolds ran the ball in from the one-yard line in the opening quarter. With the touchdown, Reynolds moved past Willie Burden and into fifth place on the Stampeders' all-time list in rushing majors. The two great running backs started the night tied with 32 rushing touchdowns apiece. During the first half, Henry Burris moved past Jeff Garcia (2,358 yards) to become the leading all-time rusher among Stampeders quarterbacks. He also surpassed Hugh McKinnis (2,357) and took over seventh spot on the overall all-time Stamps rushing list. One of the turning points of the night came on the final play of the third quarter. The Argos set up in the Wildcat formation with running back Jamal Robertson taking the snap. Robertson handed the ball to quarterback Kerry Joseph, who was immediately pressured. Carpenter hit Joseph, forced the fumble, recovered the ball and ran it back 55 yards for a touchdown.

In the absence of a couple of key receivers Friday at BC Place, the Calgary Stampeders turned to a couple of familiar faces — and one new face — on the way to recording a 48-10 victory over the BC Lions. With Nik Lewis back in Calgary and Ken-Yon Rambo forced to leave the game in the first quarter, Henry Burris went to veteran Jeremaine Copeland and rookie Jermaine Jackson to float the Stampeders' air attack. Copeland hauled in two touchdown passes and Jackson had one catch for a score. The other big story offensively was Joffrey Reynolds, who rushed for 131 yards and scored two touchdowns as the Stampeders posted a second straight victory to even their season record to 2-2. In the process of having his big night, Reynolds surpassed Willie Burden for fourth place on the Stamps' all-time rushing list. Reynolds now has 6,260 yards compared to 6,234 for Burden. The first-half touchdowns by Copeland and Jackson marked a milestone score for each receiver. For Copeland, it was his 34th career receiving major with the Stampeders, tying him with Gerry Shaw for ninth on the franchise's all-time list. For Jackson, it was the first touchdown of the rookie's CFL career. Early in the third quarter, Burris found Copeland again for a seven-yard passing score. Copeland thought he had a third touchdown later in the quarter but the on-field officials ruled a great diving catch attempt as an incomplete pass and a challenge and video review failed to overturn the call. Undaunted, the Stamps defence continued to dog the Lions. In particular, Odell Willis picked up his fourth and fifth sacks of the season and also recovered a fumble. Meanwhile, Calgary tacked on more points thanks to a pair of touchdowns by Reynolds and a couple of field goals by Sandro DeAngelis.

The Calgary Stampeders saw their two-game winning streak come to an end and their share of first place in the Canadian Football League's West Division disappear after dropping a 24-23 decision against the Saskatchewan Roughriders Saturday night at McMahon Stadium.

The loss came in heartbreaking fashion as Riders receiver Chris Getzlaf's second touchdown of the game late in the fourth quarter was the difference as Saskatchewan overcame a six-point deficit to improve to 3-2. The Stamps fall to 2-3 trailing the Riders and Edmonton Eskimos by one game.

The Riders' winning score was set up when Weston Dressler returned a missed 49-yard field goal attempt by Sandro DeAngelis for 55 yards. Two plays later, Durant hit Getzlaf for the long pass-and-run that turned the game around.

The Stampeders took the lead in the fourth quarter when quarterback Henry Burris ran the ball in from 18 yards. The score, which erased Saskatchewan's 17-13 lead, was the 40th rushing touchdown of Burris' career.

Saskatchewan had gone ahead with five minutes remaining in the third quarter when Durant connected with Dressler for a 19-yard touchdown pass.

The Stamps lost despite a second consecutive 100-yard rushing effort by Joffrey Reynolds. The 2008 CFL rushing champion finished the evening 112 yards on 14 carries. It's the 21st time in Reynolds' career he has surpassed the 100-yard mark. Meanwhile, Burris completed 17 of 29 passes for 224 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions.

The Roughriders started the game in fine fashion, gaining 17 yards on a run by Wes Cates. Five plays later, Durant hit Getzlaf with a pass and a nine-yard touchdown. After struggling on their first two possessions, the Stampeders got things going the third time they had the ball as they went 89 yards in five plays to pick up the game-tying touchdown. The march was capped by a 10-yard scoring pass from Burris to Jon Cornish.

With a 31-23 victory over the Winnipeg Blue Bombers on Saturday at McMahon Stadium, the Stampeders created a three-way tie for first place in the West Division. Calgary built a 23-3 halftime lead and survived a strong second-half performance by Winnipeg running back Fred Reid — who finished the night with 167 rushing yards and two touchdowns — to hang on for the victory. Wes Lysack's interception in the dying moments sealed the outcome.

The Stampeders, Edmonton Eskimos and Saskatchewan Roughriders are all 3-3 after six weeks of action while the BC Lions aren't too far behind at 2-4.

In avenging a Week 2 loss to Winnipeg, the Stampeders offence put up points early and often, scoring two field goals and a touchdown on their first three possessions of the night. The major was provided by Joffrey Reynolds, who carried the ball in from two yards out.

The Bombers on the board with a 54-yard field goal, but the Stamps got those points back and more when Reynolds scored his second touchdown of the night. This time, it was a receiving major as he caught a pass and lunged into the endzone for a 17-yard score.

Winnipeg got its offence going on the first drive of the second half as the Bombers went 86 yards on eight plays, with Reid capping the march with an eight-yard touchdown run.

Winnipeg added a field goal to further reduce the Stampeders' advantage, but a fumble by Blue Bombers quarterback Michael Bishop, which was recovered by Dwaine Carpenter, set up a 36-yard touchdown pass from Burris to Titus Ryan. Reid scored the only touchdown of the fourth quarter, capping a Winnipeg drive with a one-yard run for his second score of the contest.
