GAME OVERVIEW

- The Stamps are back in action for the first time since playing in the 96th Grey Cup last Nov. 23 in Montreal. The Stamps earned their sixth CFL championship by defeating the Montreal Alouettes 22-14.
- Calgary has 38 players back from the Grey Cup 46-man roster, including 12 offensive starters and seven defensive starters.
- Calgary has an all-time 29-28-1 regular-season record against the Als.
- The Stamps won both regular-season games against the Als in 2008 — 23-19 at Molson Stadium on July 10 and 41-30 at home on Sept. 12.
- The Stamps are 5-5 in their last 10 against Montreal and 5-5 in their last 10 against the Als at McMahon Stadium.
- The game will feature the CFL's 2008 Most Outstanding Player finalists in Stamps QB Henry Burris and Als QB Anthony Calvillo.

- Montreal averaged a league-high 32.4 points per game and Calgary was second with 31.6. Calgary gave up a league-low 23.3 points per game while Montreal was the next closest at 24.6.
- With a typical season, Burris will overtake Doud Flutie in all of Calgary's major passing categories this season.
- The Stamps ended 2008 by winning 10 of their last 11 games, including six in a row
- The Stamps had a league-leading +20 turnover ratio. The Als were +12.
- Calgary had the CFL's top receiver (Ken-Yon Rambo, 1,473 yds), rusher (Joffrey Reynolds, 1,310 yds) and scorer (Sandro DeAngelis, 217 pts).



STAMPEDERS STORYLINES

STAMPS BACK IN ACTION

The Stamps are back in action for the first time since winning the sixth Grey Cup in franchise history last Nov. 23, with a 22-14 win over the Montreal Alouettes in Montreal. Calgary also won titles in 1948, 1971, 1992, 1998 and 2001.

NUCLEUS INTACT

The Stamps have 38 players back from the 46 men who were on the 2008 Grey Cup roster. The only departures are: LB JoJuan Armour, DL Eddie Freeman, DL Howard Hodges, DL Charleston Hughes, DL Pat MacDonald, LB Saleem Rasheed, LB Neil Ternovatsky and QB Will Proctor.

In addition, all 12 Grey Cup offensive starters are back with the club and seven defensive starters.

NO. 1 CLOSING ON NO. 1

Burris currently sits second to Doug Flutie in most major franchise passing categories. If everything goes according to form this season, he will become the all-time leader in passing yards, touchdown passes, pass attempts and completions. Here's a look at how Burris fits into the club's leaderboards:

BURRIS SET TO BUILD ON 2008

Stamps quarterback Henry Burris had a career year in 2008 and was named the West Division nominee for Most Outstanding Player before he was the Grey Cup MVP.

Under his direction, the Stamps led the CFL with a 13-5 record and won two playoff games, including the Grey Cup over Montreal. Burris was particularly good when the games mattered most. He had a 10-3 record (including post-season) against teams with a winning record.

RAMBO, REYNOLDS LED LEAGUE

For the first time in club history, the Stamps had the league's leading receiver and rusher in the same season. Ken-Yon Rambo and Joffrey Reynolds topped the CFL in receiving and rushing, respectively.

Rambo finished with 1,473 receiving yards on 100 receptions (third in CFL). Hall of Famer Allen Pitts was the last Calgary receiver to lead the league, when he had 97 catches for 1,449 yards in 1999. Here is a look at the complete list of CFL yardage leaders:

REYNOLDS IN FIFTH SPOT

Midway through the 2008 season, Reynolds moved past James Sykes into fifth spot on the club's all-time rushing chart. Over his first three full seasons, Reynolds rushed for 4,225 yards — an average of 1,408.3 per year. He became the fifth Stamps running back to go over 6,000 career rushing yards on Oct. 24 against Hamilton.

CLEANING UP THE PENALTIES

The Stamps set a franchise record for penalty yardage in 2007 and came close to league standards for penalties. This situation improved greatly in 2008, as penalties decreased by 29 per cent and the penalty yardage decreased by 33 per cent.

Following the game, quarterback Henry Burris dedicated the game ball to Stamps president Scott Ackles and his family. Scott's father Bob passed away when he suffered a heart attack earlier this week. Bob, the BC Lions president and CEO, was 69.

"This is obviously a difficult time for Scott and his family and we want to show him some support," said Burris. "We all understand how much Bob Ackles has done for the CFL and have a lot of respect for him."

Montreal kicker Damon Duval opened the scoring with a field goal and a single before Jamel Richardson caught a 67-yard touchdown pass from Anthony Calvillo to give the hosts an 11-0 lead.

Calgary got on the board in the second quarter when Joffrey Reynolds scored on an eight-yard run. Duval then kicked a pair of field goals to give Montreal a 17-7 lead.

With five seconds remaining before halftime, DeAngelis kicked a 25-yard field goal to make the score 17-10.

"We could have had some success in the first half but we shot ourselves in the foot a few times," said head coach/GM John Huftnagel. "We stopped hurting ourselves in the second half and our defence really settled in after the first quarter."

Early in the third quarter, Burris hit Ken-Yon Rambo for a five-yard touchdown. It was Rambo's 14th touchdown catch in Calgary's last 14 games.

Duval then punted a single before DeAngelis' winning kick.

This game marked the return to Montreal of Stamps defensive coordinator Chris Jones, who held the same post for five seasons with the Als. The Stamps allowed Montreal 296 yards offence in the first half but buckled down and held the Als to 60 yards in the second half.

Prior to this victory, the Stamps had won two of their previous 14 road games and hadn't won a game outside of Alberta since 2006. The Stamps lost the turnover battle (2-0) for the third game in a row. Attendance was 20,202.

Henry Burris led the Stampeders to a 41-30 win over the Montreal Alouettes on Friday night and continued his assault on the franchise record book.

Burris threw for 408 yards and five touchdowns as he surpassed Peter Liske for second place on the club's all-time yardage list. Burris now has 16,887 yards, while Liske had 16,741. Doug Flutie owns the record with 20,551. Burris also moved past Liske for third spot on the touchdown list with 107. Earlier this season, Burris passed Jeff Garcia on the touchdown list and Jerry Keeling for fourth place in pass attempts.

"It was a big win and the guys played great," said Burris, who passed his game ball along to the offensive coaching staff. "You have to enjoy nights like and some of the personal feats but our goal is to win that big game in the playoffs."

Burris threw touchdown passes to Brett Ralph, Joffrey Reynolds, Teyo Johnson, Ken-Yon Rambo and Jeremaine Copeland as the Stamps improved to 7-4 and won for the fourth time in their last five games. In doing so, they ended Montreal's five-game winning streak and dropped the Als to 7-4.

Calgary opened the scoring in the first quarter when Burris found Ralph for a 35-yard major that capped a 107-yard drive. The Als responded with a Damon Duval field goal.

After a Sandro DeAngelis field goal, Montreal tied it when Mike Imoh scored on a 13-yard run. The Stamps then erupted with two majors in the final 42 seconds.

First, Brandon Browner picked Anthony Calvillo and set up the Stamps deep in Als territory. Reynolds caught a screen pass and raced nine yards to paydirt and then Johnson caught a jumpball on the final play of the half for a 24-10 lead at the break.

Calgary then blew it open in the third quarter on DeAngelis' second field goal and Rambo's 43-yard scoring reception. With the outcome virtually decided, Calvillo threw late touchdowns to Ben Cahoon and Kerry Watkins, sandwiched around Copeland's four-yard major.

Calgary's defence was stellar until the late lapse, pressuring Calvillo all night, sacking him once and intercepting him three times. The Stamps were plus-4 in turnovers.

The major downside for Calgary was taking 18 penalties for 191 yards. Besides Burris' 408 passing yards, they Stamps rushed for 120 yards, gave up no sacks and committed no turnovers. Attendance was 30,960.

For the sixth time in franchise history, the Calgary Stampeders were the class of the Canadian Football League. They earned the distinction in Montreal with a 22-14 win over the hometown Alouettes.

Quarterback Henry Burris was named the Grey Cup Most Valuable Player after throwing for 328 yards — with one touchdown — and leading all rushers with 79 yards on nine carries. Sandro DeAngelis was named top Canadian, as he was perfect on five field-goal attempts. DeAngelis connected from 44, 12, 21, 30 and 50 yards out.

Brett Ralph had the only touchdown for the Stampeders, hauling in a 20-yard pass from Burris late in the first half. Nik Lewis chipped in with 11 catches for 122 yards.

For the Alouettes, Avon Cobourne scored their only touchdown, a 16-yard run in the second quarter. Damon Duval was responsible for the rest of the scoring with field goals of 14 and 19 yards as well as a punt single.

Anthony Calvillo, who edged out Burris in voting for CFL Most Outstanding Player for the regular season, threw for 352 yards but had no touchdowns and two interceptions.

Montreal led 3-0 after a quarter, on a field goal from Duval. DeAngelis answered back in the second quarter with a 44-yard field goal to put the Stampeders back on even terms.

The Alouettes responded with the first touchdown of the game, a 16-yard scamper by Cobourne. Duval then kicked a 19-yard field goal to extend the Alouettes' lead.

Late in the first half, Burris found Ralph in the corner of the end zone for a 20-yard touchdown to close the gap and give the Stampeders some momentum heading to the locker-room.

In the third quarter, DeAngelis put the Stampeders back on even terms before Duval added a single to regain the lead for the Alouettes. Burris put together a 75-yard drive, including runs of 14 and 29 yards for first downs, leading to the short kick from DeAngelis.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Calvillo was intercepted by Dwight Anderson as momentum started to swing in favour of the Stampeders. That led to another field goal by DeAngelis to give the Stampeders a five-point advantage.

Midway through the frame, the Alouettes were threatening to regain the lead before an errant Calvillo pass was intercepted by Shannon James, quieting the Olympic Stadium crowd.

DeAngelis then connected from 50 yards out to extend the Stampeders lead to eight points and the Stampeders never looked back.

Calgary signed Johnson as a free agent in June of 2008. He was drafted by the Oakland Raiders in the second round (63rd overall) of the 2003 NFL draft. He was signed by the Arizona Cardinals in 2005. He went to training camp with the Miami Dolphins in 2006 and then went to the Denver Broncos camp in 2007. He signed with Buffalo on Jan. 29, 2008.

In his first season in the CFL, Johnson established himself as a versatile player for the Red and White. Johnson started 13 regular-season games at fullback, but was utilized mostly as an H-back/tight end. COLLEGE

Johnson played two seasons (2001, 2002) for Stanford University. In 23 games for the Cardinals, he totaled 79 catches for 1,032 yards and 15 touchdowns. The 15 career touchdowns ranks him 10th all-time in Stanford football history.

NOTABLE

Johnson played both basketball and football during his stay at Stanford. He has two brothers who have played football. Ahmani played at Oregon State and Riall played at Stanford. Riall is currently a member of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. An interview with Teyo Johnson was featured during sequences of the 2005 version of the popular NFL Madden video game.
